How to become a PCO?

There are two ways to become a PCO, by ELECTION or by APPOINTMENT. Let's fill ALL 219 precincts in Kitsap County with people who love this country & are ready to act! Here are the steps to get you started:

1. Find your Precinct & School District:

- A. Go to KitsapPCO.COM.
- B. Click on Find Your PCO Precinct.
- C. This will launch the County Parcel Search. Enter and select your address.
- D. In the **Identify Results** window, click **Voting Districts**.
- E. You will see your Precinct Number, Precinct Name & School District.

2. <u>Determine if your Precinct has a PCO:</u>

- A. Return to **KitsapPCO.COM**.
- B. Near the end of the page, you will see of list of Kitsap County Republican Party (KCRP) PCOs. Scroll to locate your Precinct. If you do not see your Precinct in the list, it does not have a PCO.

3. Fill out & submit the PCO Application:

- A. Return to KitsapPCO.com.
- B. Join KCRP if you are not already a member. The fee is \$30.
- C. Click on **Submit PCO Application**, print the application, fill it out, and give it to the KCRP Board member representing your school district.
